Council Commentary

With Councilman Matt Dukles

As a Grafton business owner, I stepped into public service with the hope and trust of many who supported my efforts and belief in the future of Grafton. Like many before me, I first entered office believing that government should run like a business. While that mind set is in many ways true, government adds layers upon layers of checks and balances with regulations not imposed on

private business, often slowing progress and sometimes overall growth. Working through this legislative maze has its challenges, however I am happy to say it has been a great success!

As the Village celebrates its Bicentennial, we don't need to look far to see Grafton's past. Many landmarks throughout town are a

daily reminder of history, a present part of Grafton's identity and a reminder of the legacy others have left to be preserved. The idea of continuing on in creating a legacy challenges me as I hope to help leave one for the future. Although there is much to be cherished, there is also much need in terms of *repairing*, *removing*, *and restoring* existing infrastructure through the Village of Grafton, some now exceeding the better part of the last century.

Updating Grafton's infrastructure has been and will remain at the forefront of council's consideration. Council has dug in to find funding for several improvement projects in recent years. In terms of sanitation, considerable updates to the Village's sanitary system have occurred with more to come in the near future. Looking at street repairs, Grafton commissioned the reconstruction of North Main Street, although this project was an inconvenience to many during construction, the finished improvement greatly improved the gateway to the community and historic downtown district. In

2015, Grafton reconstructed Mechanic Street south from Main Street and this past summer completing Mechanic Street from Main Street to Elm Street. This was another dynamic improvement into the downtown district. In addition, improvements were made to several streets with resurfacing and various pavement repairs. In regards to electric

changes, lighting improvements are underway installing

new energy efficient LED lighting. In addition to energy savings, the LED lights provide a greater consistency and quality of lighting. This costly improvement is being done in phases as thirty to sixty LED fixtures

are being installed yearly. The Village hopes to have most replaced by the end of the year in 2019. Touching on water improvements, plans are moving forward to build a new Water Tower in the downtown district. A 'loop' waterline connection under the CSX tracks is to be installed as well as building a new water booster pump station at the site of the former water plant. Stay tuned for more, there is so much to look forward to.

Serving as Grafton's Ward 1 Councilman, has truly been an honor. I thank everyone who made that possible.

Services Update

Making greater Grafton even GREATER! The first of a 4-part series highlighting Grafton's commitment to modern infrastructure By: Joe Price – Village Administrator

A vital part of a vibrant community comes from its ability to function every moment of every day. Just as a firm foundation is needed to support the structures we build, the infrastructure of a community works to benefit the body of residents and businesses that rely on safe roads to connect us, electricity to power our day, clean water to sustain life and a sanitary system to protect water quality and overall public health.

Out-of-sight to most, the Grafton Waste Water Treatment Plant (WWTP) located on McAplin Court, operates 24-hours a day, 7-days a week, receiving the flow of mostly liquid waste, removing foreign materials, treating raw sewage, separating solids from greywater, treating and cleansing the liquids and discharging clear water into the Black River tributary. The entire process from entry to discharge, is under the supervision of three sanitary department employees, all of which are certified waste water treatment operators, and each accountable to the stringent regulatory oversight of the Ohio Environmental Protection Agency.

The WWTP has been and will remain a key component to the

growth and sustainable economy here in Grafton. Representing a lifetime estimated investment in excess of forty million dollars, the plant is capable of treating 1.5 million gallons of sewage daily. Currently, the plant runs at slightly less than two-thirds capacity. With future growth in mind, the plant as it exists was designed to be expanded to treat one-and-a-half times its current maximum capacity.

Storm water has the potential of over running and inundating a sanitary system when storm water enters the sanitary system through cross connections, open sanitary cleanouts or illegal connections to the sanitary system. I & I (Inflow and Infiltration) can create a volume of liquids greater than the system is designed to treat, compromising the treatment plant capacity in a variety of ways, including possibly allowing raw sewage to flow directly into

the Black River that may cause sanitary sewage back-up into residential and commercial properties.

Seeing a need and addressing a concern, in 2015 the Village completed construction of a 5 million gallon Equalization Basin, a \$3.5 million investment. The EQ Basin automatically comes on line during server storm events when flow to the plant exceeds normal flow or maximum flow capacity. When activated, three high volume pumps then pull from the sanitary system inlet and pumps the material into the EQ Basin, where it holds the wastewater and keeps the WWTP operating without interruption and greatly reduces the chance of sewage backing up into homes and businesses in a storm event. An additional benefit is the added protection the EQ Basin provides to our Black River watershed and the quality of water that eventually makes it way to Lake Erie. When the storm event ends, pumps in the EQ Basin then slowly release the sewage into the WWTP treatment system for controlled treatment and processing. This process that can take up to four days to complete.

The common factors in every waste water treatment system is: what goes in, must come down; what goes down, must come out; what comes out, better have someone there to decide what needs to be done with it! The Village of Grafton is fortunate to employ the full-time services of three outstand professionals in the field of waste water treatment. Class 3 Operator of record and WWTP Manager, **Chad Riffle**, Class 3 Operator **Tom Rice** and Class 2 Operator **Jacob Beal**. The next time you see Chad, Tom or Jake... let them know how much you appreciate all they do to keep Grafton regular, and our sewage out-of-sight.
