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Council Commentary: Council President-John Lescher

Reporting from Village Council, I would like to take this opportunity to share an update regarding important matters that concern our residents. First and foremost, all elected officials in the Village of Grafton encourage our residents to remain educated about the bills that they pay on a regular basis. Whether they are electric bills or gas rates, residents should always take an extra moment to review the fine print of their monthly statements. Anyone who pays bills on a regular basis knows the importance of paying their amount due on time, but we also encourage you to take the extra step to learn what your rates actually are. Knowledge is power, and in some cases, knowledge can also be protection against scams and other sales-minded entities who claim they have lower rates on various utilities than what you are already paying.

Your tax bill is important to know as well. As a long-time Councilman in the Village of Grafton, I am consistently asked about where our tax dollars go. Residents should understand that by Ohio law, a percentage of earned income is the sustaining revenue source for Village operations. In other words, those people who earn income in the Village of Grafton pay a small percentage of their income towards the Village. Only a small percentage of property taxes come to Grafton as well, whereas a much greater percentage of this type of tax goes to fund our school district and other various county entities. Please take a moment to read your tax bill, know the amounts you are paying



and recognize where your tax dollars are going. Your Village of Grafton officials would also like to remind you that EMS and fire calls are not paid by the taxpayers. When a call or run of some sort is initiated that requires fire or EMS services, the Village contacts the insurance company and they reimburse the Village for the cost of the service. Whatever amount is collected from insurance is considered paid-in-full. We do not go back to the resident for any balances. We have been able to fund Police/Fire / EMTs without additional levies.

Ultimately, knowing the specifics of your utility bill, your tax bills and where your dollars are being spent is information that will be a valuable source of power and protection for you in the future. The Village believes that a wise and informed citizenry is the backbone of any local municipality. As always, those of you who have questions can contact your Council representatives, the Mayor or anyone else at Village Hall anytime for more information. PUBLIC NOTICE: October 17, 2017, Village Council approved a 5% water rate increase beginning in January 2018. Seeing the water fund decline over the past three-years, council earlier this year funded a Water Rate Study. The water system had absorbed all added costs-to-operate since 2012 without any rate increase to residential and commercial customers. The Rural Lorain County Water Authority, Grafton's water supplier, has announced an added wholesale rate increase for 2018. The Rural Water wholesale rate increase could and most likely would accelerate the decline of the water fund. The 2017 water rate study recommended a 5% increase in 2018, followed by a 5% increase in both 2019 and 2020 (15% over three-years). Council unanimously decided to take a conservative approach to this concern, approving a 5% increase in 2018 with plans to monitor the fund balance through the fall of 2018 to see if an additional 5% increase in 2019 would be absolutely necessary to keep the water fund solvent.

Making greater Grafton even GREATER!

The fourth of a 4-part series highlighting Grafton's commitment to modern infrastructure -2017

Paving the pathway of progress...

Recently, much has been discussed throughout the national political subdivisions about addressing the needed improvements of an aging infrastructure in the United States. Here in Grafton, one doesn't need look far to see your village officials working well ahead of political rhetoric with an aggressive action and plan to

proactively address aging infrastructure.


A decade ago the reconstruction and improvements of Center Street, began a pilot process to address aging infrastructure. Shortly afterwards the recession took hold of the country, most municipalities were forced to conserve resources including

funding for infrastructure projects, and Grafton did as well. In 2011 the village proactively began planning for the SR 57 (N. Main St) reconstruction and widening. Working with engineering, funding, and partnering with ODOT, reconstruction was completed in mid-2015. Even as work was underway on N. Main, the village planned complete reconstruction of Mechanic St. Phase 1, this too was completed in 2015. The village then stepped up infrastructure improvements as it planned and completed Mechanic St. Phase 2 reconstruction in 2016.

The long-awaited Water Tower project along with the new booster pump station project and the Main St. waterline loop projects have finally received approval to proceed. All projects went out to bid in September and if all goes as planned, all three projects will be awarded by the time this publication is in your homes with construction completed in 2018.

In 2016, village streets underwent an evaluation regarding overall condition. Areas of concern were documented, and a 4-year plan is now in place to address replace streets where needed, replacing entire sections of roadway in some, repair failing sections of roadway and

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resurface roads where applicable. Two of the streets rated critical in 2016 were Nantucket and Chippewa. Nantucket underwent total pavement replacement, driveway apron replacement, drainage improvements and four new storm sewer catch basins were installed. Chippewa underwent total roadway and driveway apron replacement, both projects completed this past September.

Future street improvement planning continues... The village sought funding for Oak St. reconstruction in August 2016. The village was awarded a \$265,000.00 grant towards this \$1.2 million reconstruction project. As we wait approval from CSX to bore under tracks for waterlines and sewers, we hope to see construction completed during the summer of 2018. Additionally, we recently applied for similar funding for the reconstruction of Chestnut Phase 1. If all goes as we hope, we'll seek final approval for Chestnut Phase 2, with construction to completion in 2020.

Parks and recreations improvements are currently under consideration. The old water plant in front of Willow Park will be demolished in 2018 and the land restored for park use. Other Willow Park improvements considered include possibly constructing a concert venue for future events. Council is also considering soccer field improvements. The North Park playground received attention with replacement of all platforms in 2017, and after several attempts, valve

functions of the splash pad were significantly improved.

As weather conditions allow, seasonal brush grinding and leaf pick up will end on or before November 29th. Leaf pick up is heavily dependent on dry conditions, wet leaf piles cannot be picked up. If for any reason leaf fall is later than normal, weather permitting we may continue to pick up leaves in early December. PLEASE do not allow piles of leaves to remain on your tree lawns throughout the winter as they will kill your grass.

Fuel for thought; the reconstruction of roadway projects big and small, always create a hardship during construction for local residents living in or near the workzone, and all your village officials are conscientious of this. Although we plan and take measures to limit hardships, often unforeseen conditions and weather play a part in the time needs to complete each project. When completed, the one thing we all can appreciate is the visible enhancement to our neighborhoods, safer roadway accessibility, improved property values, and the overall renewed pride in all of our neighborhoods. We hope you'll agree, when completed your short-term hardships and sacrifice are worthwhile the long-term benefits they provide our community.
