My, how quickly things can change. When we last corresponded in March, the Village of Grafton had recently hosted its 2nd annual State of the Village presentation and the future was bright. Within days, all of that changed with the onset of the COVID-19 pandemic. News on April 20th that school would remain online for the remainder of the 2019-2020 School Year was shocking. However, in light of the current health crisis, the good news is that based upon the statistics of the last two weeks, the curve is flattening

slightly in Ohio. Yet, even with this good news, Governor DeWine continues to caution in his daily Press Conferences that the Coronavirus is still out there and it will be something we have to live with until we obtain a vaccine which could be available in a year or so. The Governor understands the importance of "opening up our government," and so beginning earlier this month on May 1st, the state began a phased-in approach to re-opening the state economy. The plan to open Ohio's economy is a work in progress, but it is crucial that we do so in the right way or the consequences could be catastrophic. Governor DeWine will be working with the Governors of Illinois, Michigan, Wisconsin, Minnesota, Indiana and Kentucky to reopen the region's economy in a coordinated and systematic way. Life is going to look a little different until we get a vaccine. People will be encouraged to wear a mask in public and big events such as fairs, sporting events and concerts can be very problematic in the spread of the virus.

Car paint, balloons, streamers, spiritedly dressed students and teachers participated in this event. Onlookers cheered and clapped while dressed in their own Midview swag. A school bus and its driver waved to the community, while escorted by the Village's public safety officials. The COVID-19 situation has dealt the graduating senior class with an unexpected and unprecedented circumstance. We congratulate these particular students on their resilience, strength, determination and flexibility during this time. Great job to all who participated to make this day and parade very special.



### **Infrastructure Projects and Village Upgrades Push Forward**

The Village of Grafton presses forward with a number of infrastructure projects that were already in progress at the start of the calendar year 2020. Such projects are considered to be investments in the future of our community, and work to establish a sense of enhanced connectiveness among our neighborhoods adjacent to downtown. During the COVID-19 pandemic, many individuals in Grafton are enjoying the breaks in the weather with walks around town. Some of these capital improvement projects help to serve this growing need for walkability.

#### **Community Center at North Park**

In May, a number of upgrades are slated to take place at the Community Center to enhance the overall experience for residents and rental opportunities. Some of those upgrades will include

the completion of the installation of new front windows, along with a new roof being installed at some point during calendar year 2020 as well. The Village of Grafton is also looking to add new doors and upgraded entry system to help improve the safety and security of the building as well. An interior upgrade to the facility is anticipated as well, enhancing the overall decor and furniture within the area. The Village knows that the Community Room is one of the most utilized assets in the Village of Grafton, and in order to keep it on pace to make it a fine amenity in the future, more investments will be made here as well.

### Waste Water Treatment Center Enhancements



The new centrifuge was installed last year to make the separations process of dry material and compliant water more technologically advanced, efficient and cost effective.

### **Chestnut Street Enhancements**

The Chestnut Street reconstruction project continues at full steam and the addition of new watermains, new residential lateral supply connections, a new natural gas line and new sanitary sewer mains with lateral taps will also be included upon project completion. In addition, new stormwater drainage is part of the project, curb and gutter construction and, finally, a full pavement replacement component. The first phase scope of work will include all infrastructure from Mechanic Street to Main Street. In March 2019, the project was awarded a grant for Underground Utilities for \$865,688.25 and an OPWC grant/loan funding of \$400,000. The Village remains hopeful that the project is on track for a completion later this summer.

The Village of Graton has made a number of important upgrades at the Waste Water Treatment Facility as well, which has been reported in the pages of this newsletter over the years. The installation of the centrifuge has made a permanent impact on the effective operations of the Waste Water Treatment Facility, helping to improve safety and overall facility efficiency. This technology allows for a more accurate separation of dry cake material from the water, reducing our tipping fees for the sludge material that must be hauled offsite. Technology makes the operation of the centrifuge safer and simpler in a nearby control room, where pushbutton innovation helps to control the machine. In addition, a new 4,900 square foot facility on the south part of the property is out for bid at the moment that will provide more administrative, work and equipment storage space for the operation.

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### Solar Energy Park Already Paying Dividends for Village Residents

Village residents in Grafton are already experiencing an overall total electric cost savings from the visionary Grafton Solar Energy Park that launched during calendar year 2019. In partnership with Safari Energy, a leading national solar partner and design engineers, Eitri Foundry, the Village of Grafton flipped the switch on the 5.7-megawatt solar energy farm with the idea of creating renewable energy and bringing a dynamic economic development opportunity to Lorain County. The byproduct has been a reduced electricity bill for residents, who as of late were experiencing lower power cost adjustment rates monthly, April's power cost adjustment averaged approximately \$3.20. The ground-mounted system spans nearly

35 acres and at full capacity, is expected to generate more than 280 million kilowatt hours of electricity in its lifetime over the next 30 years, offsetting an estimated equivalent of nearly 200,000 metric tons of greenhouse gas emissions, that some sources claim, could charge more than 25 billion smartphones.

The nearby chart demonstrates the cross-section of a 7-day time frame and the estimated reductions experienced by Village residents. Grafton leaders were dedicated from the very launch of this project to be on the cutting edge of technology while keeping citizens' best interests at the forefront. Several months into the project, the investment in solar energy is already paying off for the Village. Stay tuned for more information in the near future on this project. The unique consideration of this project is this Solar project does not generate any additional revenue for city finances, instead, by design it lowers cost to all Grafton Electric customers allowing them to keep more of their hard earned money strengthening their personal and/or business finances.
