

Village of Grafton to Invest \$7 million in Capital Improvement Projects This Year

The Village of Grafton continues investing in the long-term capital infrastructure needs, and the following pages will briefly summarize each project, share a cost estimate and funding sources, and reveal anticipated completion times. Thank you to everyone who has played a meaningful role in these capital improvement projects for today, and for the future.

Envision Grafton Main Street Continued Construction - \$1.4 million

The Main Street construction process includes a variety of components, including new curb and gutters from the railroad tracks on Erie Street to the lights on Mechanic Street. Keep in mind, as we have shared in the past, that the future parking scheme will be reversed, to permit rear-entry parking. The project will also consist of new bump-outs, feature landscape and hard scape, new lights and two crosswalks with rapid-flash beacons to help control speed and enhance walkability. In addition, the Village will be re-aligning Parsons Road to turn it 90 degrees to create a safer intersection configuration. This project will begin in the early spring and intends to be completed by the end of September. The approximately \$1.4 million in costs is helping to be funded through ODOT safety funds, OPWC and NOACA TLCI Implementation funds, with close to 90% of the total cost being funded by outside agencies.

In addition, another grant was secured to pave the remainder of Parsons Road, so that the two can be connected, even though part of separate projects. The additional paving equates to approximately \$260,000 in costs, with 50% being paid by these grants. This project will include a complete mill-and-resurface and will involve the Main Street intersection to the Village corporation limits.

Mechanic Street/Crook Street Improvements - \$1.3 million

The Mechanic Street and Crooks Street Improvements will be another major capital improvement focus, including sanitary sewer lines and significant storm water improvements. It will also include a complete mill-and-resurface. The \$1.3 million in total project costs is being made possible by funding from Ohio Public Works along with OWD Authority. The benefit of this major project is that Grafton residents will see aging infrastructure replaced, to supplement the water lines that were replaced in 2021. New fire hydrants will enhance public safety access in the event of an emergency as well, and the connectivity to existing sidewalks will improve the walkability for residents as well.

Sub Station Rebuild and Major Renovations - \$3.7 million improvement

As the residents will recall, the Village of Grafton is making a substantial improvement in the Sub Station Rebuild and enhancement. The electrical conversion taking place involves 4kV to 12kV of electrical distribution, which significantly improves the future sustainability for our community. The Village will continue updating the community on this important infrastructure item, since it directly impacts energy usage and costs today and for generations to come.

Reservoir Park Trail Enhancement for Connectivity - \$225,000

During 2022, the Village of Grafton will be accepting bids for approximately \$225,000 in trail improvements and enhancements in and accepting bids for 225,000 for trails around Reservoir Park, to continue upgrading the experience for park users in our community. The Village desires to make newly constructed trailheads from Main Street, thereby creating an access point for entry into the park. The surface of the trailways is anticipated to be a mix of crushed and paved aggregate, with wide path lanes to accommodate multiple pedestrians and hiking enthusiasts. Our hope is that visitors to the park can circumnavigate the entirety of Reservoir Park, all the way around the baseball diamonds. And yes, the Village is hopeful to be completed with this pathway by early summer, making an intended connection with the anticipated walkways at Willow Park.

Willow Crest Subdivision Sanitary Lift Station and Forced Main - \$600,000

The Village is also heavily involved in the construction of a sanitary lift station and forced main in the Willow Crest subdivision, which will significantly accommodate approximately 125-150 homes in the future. The idea behind the lift station is the desire to not run additional sewage downline, and will improve the serviceability for the homes being constructed there. Once again, this project represents a much needed improvement, that while not as glamorous as others, will improve the quality of life for generations to come.

Washington Drive Water Line Replacement-\$404,000

The Washington Drive Water Line Replacement project will be underway during 2022 as well. The water line in this project will loop to nearby Woodland Chase and will include some minor storm water improvements as well. There will be approximately 60% paving within this project. The purpose of this project is to reduce the breaks in the lines as well as the hammering on the lines as well. While the anticipated cost of this project is \$404,000, the OPWC will be playing a lead and key role on the funding aspect.

WHAT IS GRAFTON TOMORROW?

A comprehensive plan completed by the village, a resident-appointed Steering Committee, and planning consultants. Due to the pandemic, the project took just over two years to complete. The village utilized a four-phased approach of Discovery, Collaborative/ Visioning, Plan Development, and Public Review/Final Adoption to determine a vision for the future of Grafton ("Grafton Tomorrow"). This document will guide public policy in terms of transportation, utilities, land use, recreation, housing, economic development, and downtown development for years to come.

Who was involved in Grafton Tomorrow?

The Mayor, Administration, Police and Fire, Village Council, Planning & Zoning Commission, Board of Zoning Appeals, Planning Consultants, Citizens, Local Business and Building Owners, Civic and Community Groups, the Lorain County Metro Parks, the Midview Schools, the Grafton-Midview Public Library, and Lorain County Community Development.





What is the Plan's General Guiding Principles?

- 1. Grafton has a unique sense of character and community, a true "hometown."
- 2. Grafton's connections for all modes of transportation (vehicular, bicycle, and pedestrian) are very important to residents and visitors.
- 3. Grafton's historic downtown is the living room of the community and attention must be given to existing buildings, businesses, and management.
- 4. Grafton's parks, recreation, and greenspaces are very important to residents and visitors and should be preserved and expanded to meet the needs of existing and future residents and visitors.
- 5. Grafton's existing industrial and commercial developments are very important and should be expanded to meet increasing demands of residents and visitors.
- Grafton's residential stock is varied but needs to be more age and price diverse to attract people in different stages of their lives.
- 7. Grafton is one community with no north/south divide and all planning elements will recognize this.


